North Carolina Represented in 2015 Beef Leaders Institute

Mark Wilburn II of Asheboro, N.C., attended the five-day educational event.

Mark Wilburn II, Asheboro, N.C., joined an elite group of American Angus Association® members by attending the eighth-annual Beef Leaders Institute (BLI) June 22-26. BLI is a complete pasture-to-plate experience for young leaders in the Angus industry, encompassing genetic selection tools, herd health, feedlot, packing and retail product distribution. This year's class consisted of 16 Angus enthusiasts.

"This experience has increased my knowledge of the industry as a whole," Wilburn says. "I plan to bring this knowledge home and implement it to serve the needs of my customers and the industry."

As a first generation Angus breeder, Wilburn of Uwharrie Ridge Farms is making an impact on the industry. Currently, he is serving on the North Carolina Angus Board of Directors and is the chairman of the North Carolina Angus Spring Fever sale committee. Wilburn has also worked on the fundraising and social events committee for the Eastern Regional Junior Angus Show.

Ashley Mitchell, Association assistant director of events and education, explains that BLI targets young leaders in the Angus industry, aged 25-45, and gives them opportunities to see all sectors of the industry and how Angus plays a role in each of them.

The five-day event, funded by the Angus Foundation, began in St. Joseph, Mo., at the Association headquarters. Participants interacted with staff and learned how each department works to serve more than 25,000 Angus members.

New this year was the addition of Certified Angus Beef LLC (CAB) to the tour. Mitchell says this lets producers see how CAB has impacted the marketing opportunities for Angus breeders and how cattlemen can reach the Certified Angus Beef® (CAB®) brand target.

Visiting four states while on the BLI tour, participants were able to experience Boehringer Ingleheim, St. Joseph, Mo.; Tyson processing plant, Dakota City, Neb.; TransOva, Sioux Center, Iowa; Gregory Feedlot, Tabor, Iowa; GeneSeek, Lincoln, Neb.; Sysco Cleveland, Ohio; CAB headquarters, Wooster, Ohio; and Buehler's Milltown, Wooster, Ohio.

Allen Farms - A family farm thriving in Anson County

When talking with the Allen family, you automatically understand how important their farm and their family are to one another. Allen Farms is located in Polkton, NC, which is in upper Anson County near Rocky River. Scotty and Alicia Allen and their three kids, Logan, Hayden, and Olivia, live on the farm and all help with various aspects of their operation. It truly is a family affair at Allen Farms.

As Scotty says, farming is in their blood. He states that he has been farming all of his life, a family tradition passed down by his dad Steve. The whole family currently runs about 250-300 head of cattle along with ten chicken houses. While they previously also farmed row crops, they pastured in all of the cropland in 1996 to accommodate for more cattle.

Scotty says that since they have always had cows, it seems that they have had a few of every kind but have now established an Angus-based commercial herd. He remembers using about every breed you can think of including Hereford, Brahman, Saler, Gelbvieh, Charolais, Santa Gertrudis, etc. However, they now run mainly Angus based cattle and primarily Angus bulls. They have had a great deal of success running their commercial operation with Angus-based genetics. They focus on using high-growth bulls that will produce top-quality calves that they will then market as feeder calves or keep as replacement females.

One of the most beneficial aspects of the Allen's program is their use of Artificial Insemination each year. They have been using AI in their herd for more than ten years and Logan has recently taken an Al course to help Al the farm's cows. They have one pasture with about 25 head that they All each year and have also Al'ed their heifers the past 2-3 years. This past year they performed a timed AI program for both the cows and heifers. By utilizing AI in their herd, they have been able to increase the genetic merit in their herd significantly each year. Even though Scotty admits to using some Gelbvieh or Hereford genetics in his Al program, he mainly uses high growth, performance-oriented Angus bulls. Some of the bulls he has used include Upward, Total, CC&7, Conveyance, Upside, Tour of Duty, Tehama R525, and Deer Valley All In. The Allens keep many of the heifers from these Al matings and have also kept a couple of bulls from the Al sires out of their top cows.

Olivia and Hayden have taken an interest in the genetics of their farm too. Alicia says you can often find them looking through AI books and researching which bulls they want to use. They keep up with their bulls and AI dates in their phone to help make sure they can always be found.

Although the AI program has been advantageous to their operation, the cleanup bulls are also a major part of the equation. The family focuses on using primarily Angus

bulls for their entire herd. For many years they have used bulls from Bruce Shankle, EBS Farms, who is actually located right up the road from their farm. Some of the bulls they have utilized from EBS Farms have been sons of Exacto, Neutron, and CC&7. Most recently they purchased a SydGen Diamond 8499 son from the 2015 Stanly Select Bull Sale. They are also currently using a Confidence son from Springfield Angus and two Angus bulls from Blue Q Ranch.

While the genetics play a major role in the quality of their calves, the Allens have also developed an exceptional management program to ensure the calves' success. Scotty and Logan have both gone through the NC Beef Quality Assurance Program and are BQA Certified. In order to keep accurate records that are useful and beneficial to the farm, Scotty has utilized the CattleMax software for many years. He says they have recently switched to the online version of the program and while it may take him some time to adjust to the program, the kids have adjusted to using it with ease! He says it is great for looking up information on the go on his phone and even the kids use it while they are out on the farm.

When calves are born it is a team effort to make sure they are tagged and the information is documented. Their calving season runs from mid-October to December 31st. While Scotty does most of the actual tagging, he calls out the information for Hayden or Olivia to write down in the "tag book." They normally document the calf's tag, if it is a bull or heifer, and the momma's tag number and will later transfer this data to the CattleMax program.

One important thing I learned while visiting with the Allens is Scotty's strict policy concerning cows that do not produce a calf. Through years of keeping accurate records he found that the cows that lost a calf almost always lost another calf a few years down the road. Therefore, if a cow does not get bred or does not have a live calf, it is off to the stockyard for the cow. I found out that he takes this policy very seriously! Hayden's show heifer from last year unfortunately

lost her first calf and Scotty was ready to follow his policy as normal. Luckily for Hayden and his cow "Kate," neighbor Bruce Shankle came to the rescue and brought a calf for the cow to adopt to prove she could be a good momma cow. To everyone's delight, Kate and calf are still on the farm and doing well!

One reason that the Allens can follow this policy so strictly is because they focus on developing their top end of heifers as replacement females for their herd. Mr. Allen says that when a cow is sold, there is always a heifer there that can replace her. These heifers are primarily Angus-based though usually not purebred females. They are developed at the farm and have been Al bred to calving ease bulls the past few years.

When it comes time to market their calves, the Allens utilize various marketing opportunities. The majority of the cattle are sold in grouped lots either through the feeder calf sales at Stanly County Livestock Market in Norwood or truckload lots through the Rocky River Cattle Alliance. Some of their calves will sell in the Norwood BQA Feeder Calf Sale in July or September. These calves will have been weaned for 45+ days and double vaccinated according to the Merck PrimeVac program and usually receive the highest prices at market. Allen Farms was a part of some of the first truckload lots in the area and have continued this method of marketing when possible. By grouping cattle into like groups the Allens are able to capitalize on the price they can receive for their calves.

While I have known the Allens for a long time, I came to know them better when the kids started showing cattle through 4-H. While oldest son Logan does not show cattle anymore he works on the farm and is important to the daily tasks on the farm. He recently graduated high school and just completed his EMT class. Twins Hayden and Olivia are home-schooled and their farm chores usually work hand-in-hand with their schooling, says Alicia. They are also showing two new heifers this fall in what will be their fourth year showing cattle.

Hayden and Olivia are members of the Anson County 4-H Livestock Club and are active in different activities in the club. Recently they competed at the NC Junior Beef Round-Up Skillathon contest where their team placed second in the junior division. Alicia says she loves having the kids participate in the club and show in the Farm Credit Showmanship Circuit in the fall. She explains, "It is a great community feel with everyone being willing to help each other out." Their extension agent in Anson County, Jessica Morgan, has also been a great asset to their group in teaching the kids and getting them excited about livestock.

The Allens are also active in their community. They are members of the Anson County Cattlemen's Association, Wightman United Methodist Church, and also attend First United Methodist Church in Norwood. Additionally Mrs. Allen runs a photography business in her "spare time," though if you live on a farm you know there really is no such thing.

The Allen family is one of the most genuine and kindest families you will meet. They are constantly trying to improve their cattle herd through a top-notch management program and the use of high-growth Angus genetics. When talking about the future, they plan to continue adding registered and commercial Angus cattle to their operation. Oh, and maybe a couple of show heifers too!





Marketing Temperament in Angus Cattle

Disposition is an important and economically relevant trait in cattle. Information published by South Dakota State University showed that 1 in 5 youth injuries on farms are caused by animals, with cattle causing 57% of these injuries. Half of these injuries occurred when cattle were confined for medical procedures or being loaded for transport. In a 2008 report by the U.S. Center for Disease Control of human fatalities involving cattle, almost half involved bulls, and 1/3 involved animals that had shown aggressive behavior prior to the fatality.

Experts estimate that the genetic heritability of disposition in cattle is 37%. This means the trait is highly heritable and rapid gains in disposition can be made by thoughtful mating decisions. As of the fall of 2015, the American Angus Association (AAA) has approximately 200,000 records in the docility (doc) database. This generates 740,000 docility EPDs. Presently, the average docility EPD is reported to be +10 with a standard deviation of 8. This means roughly 68% (or 2/3) of Angus cattle fall between a docility EPD of +2 and +18. The possible range of EPD's for docility are -30 to +45.

Temperament data is accepted by the Angus association on yearling cattle between the ages of 320-440 days of age. The association utilizes a 6 point phenotype scoring system recommended by the Beef Improvement Federation (BIF).

Score 1. Docile

Score 2. Restless

Score 3. Nervous

Score 4. Flighty

Score 5. Aggressive

Score 6. Very Aggressive

Genetic tests utilized by AAA predict approximately 65% of the genetic differences in docility in tested animals. The most accurate genetic representation of docility to date are genomic enhanced EPDs (GE EPDs) that utilize performance, genomic, and pedigree information.

There is economic value in cattle that are docile. Tri-County Steer Carcass Futurity Data published in 2014 showed that cattle classified as calm outperformed cattle classified as restless or nervous in average daily gain, mortality rate, hot carcass weight, USDA quality grade, and marbling score. In a three state pooled reproductive study with over 1,400 cows, the pregnancy rate for cows scored as calm was 6% higher than cows scored as excitable (94.1% vs. 88.6%). The cows classified as excitable

took an additional 24 days to become pregnant. In a second study, 1,400 cows were examined twice for pregnancy (at 2 and 6 months). Calm cows had a 3.2% fetal death loss, and excitable cows had a 5.5% death loss.

In my experience the most common docility score is 2. These cattle are very respectful of personal space, safe to work, and perceived to be calm. Our customers like this level of disposition, and favorably comment on their disposition. Cattle that are scored 4 to 6 are culled and removed from the breeding herd.

While docility is 37% heritable, it is important to remember 73% of what is seen is explained by management. This makes high quality animal handling and welfare an important part of animal training and subsequent behavior.

Using across-breed EPDs

It is well-documented that expected progeny differences (EPDs) are the best tools to make genetic progress, but comparing EPDs directly from different breeds is not possible without a little help. That help comes from our friends at the U.S. Meat Animal Research Center (USMARC) near Clay Center, Neb., who each year at the Beef Improvement Federation (BIF) meeting release the annual across-breed EPD (AB-EPD) table.

Putting on the same base

These adjustment factors (see Table 1) are available for 18 of the most common U.S. beef breeds. They are calculated by using EPDs from the most recent national cattle evaluations of the included breeds and then calculating "adjustments" using progeny of each of the represented breeds born as part

of the Germplasm Evaluation Program at USMARC.

AB-EPDs are useful for a couple of reasons.

- 1. They can be used to directly compare bulls of different breeds for selection or mating purposes.
- 2. They can help cattlemen grasp how average cattle in one breed compare to

the average in another breed.

The AB adjustment table allows breeders to directly compare EPDs for animals of different breeds by adding an adjustment factor to the non-Angus animals (essentially converting all other animals to an Angus base). To illustrate the utility of the tool, let's work through an example.

Let's assume you are considering a Hereford bull and an Angus bull. Both have a birth weight (BW) EPD of 1.6 in the sire summary or online lookup from their respective association. As mentioned above, those within-breed EPDs cannot be directly compared. To compare the bulls on a level playing field, AB-EPDs must be computed

first. You'll notice that the AB-EPD table directs us to add 2.7 to Hereford BW EPDs to convert them to an Angus base.

So, to compare them directly, add the 2.7 adjustment factor to the 1.6 Hereford BW EPD to establish his BW AB-EPD of 4.3, which is directly comparable to the Angus bull's 1.6 AB-EPD (1.6 + 0.0 = 1.6). As BW EPD is expressed in pounds, if mated to the same set of cows, the AB-EPDs predict the Charolais bull would sire calves averaging 2.7 lb. heavier at birth (4.3 - 1.6 = 2.7).

Tables 2 and 3 show how several of the most popular breeds compare to Angus for BW and weaning weight (WW) EPDs. Shown in the table are the average EPD as reported by each breed, the AB adjustment factor, AB-EPD and where that AB-EPD would rank in the Angus breed.

It's interesting to note that a breed like Charolais, a Continental breed, performs about as we would expect based on classic definitions of Continental European breeds. They excel in growth, but they may

present challenges from a heifer calving ease standpoint.

However, a breed like Red Angus, which many assume is just a different-colored black Angus, actually performs quite differently, with their "average" WW EPD putting them in the bottom 10% of the Angus breed.

In August, the American Angus Association rolled out an updated look to the AAA Login website. I'm sure if you logged into your account recently you were probably surprised to see that the setup of your account changed dramatically. They took a cue from the current look of smartphones and tablet devices with the intent to make AAA Login more user-friendly for any producer looking to access or submit data on their herd.

The Classic Menu page is gone, which contained over 300 different link options. Instead, the home login page has been broken down into six different categories or graphic buttons as seen in Figure 1. Pop-up descriptions for what can be found under each button are visible as you hover over a specific button.

The My Account button allows you to manage your login profile and password, view account balances and history of work in the office. The My Customers button allows you to maintain a database of customers with their full contact information and sales history with animals they purchased.

When submitting work online to the Association, the common buttons for use will be Registration/Transfers/Performance and DNA. If selected, either one will bring up another series of graphic buttons to select from that pertain to each specific topic. This extra level will allow you to narrow in on the topic of your choice and get right to work. The actual submission screens in these areas have not changed, just how you navigate to the area when compared to the Classic Menu. XOW and **THEX**: Memories and Thoughts on the NCAA and the Angus Business...

Memories...what a good time I have had in the cattle business.

The 1998 N.C. Angus Association Montana and North Dakota trip featured visits to several of the most well-known Angus ranches in the country: Gardner Denowh, Felton Angus Ranch, Medicine Rocks Angus Ranch, Schaff's Angus Valley, Vermilion Ranch, and Rolling Rock Angus. The forty or so NCAA members who went also enjoyed visiting Hawkeye West Bull Stud.

However, on returning to North Carolina, we all agreed that the most interesting, enjoyable and educational visit was to Ted Tescher and Family Cattle Company smack in the middle of the

South Dakota badlands, closest town Medora.

The Teschers, Ted and Kay, with their children Tess and Dusty, operate a commercial ranch and visiting a commercial ranch was not the usual plan for our trips. Most of the travelers were registered breeders and on our Angus trips we usually visited the well-known ranches where the top dollar bulls were bred. However, at the last minute as I prepared the final itinerary, I happened to see a blurb about Ted Tescher in a cattle magazine and a call to Kay Tescher cemented a visit there. Ted and Kay were surprised that we wanted to come. We were their first tour group ever.

Their "ground" (as they say out west) is miles from Medora and smack in the middle of the rough and rocky terrain which made us wonder how on earth cattle survive there. The schools their children attended were unreachable during the harsh winter months so the children boarded with relatives in Medora. I seem to remember that the trip from home to Medora on the school bus during mild weather took two hours. Ted had just purchased an old car for his fifteen year old son to drive himself and Tess to the bus stop.

When we arrived at the Tescher's, we were struck by a narrow tall row of evergreen trees which appeared to be a windbreak between them and the road. "No," they said, "Although it does act as a windbreak, it is to give us privacy". We estimated it was a traffic

jam if one car passed the ranch every 8 hours.

All of the Teschers are involved in the work of the ranch and most of their work is done on horseback because the cattle are scattered over many acres and the land is very rough and forage is sparse. Round-ups to "work" the cattle are a group effort with cowboys and cowgirls from local ranches joining forces with Ted and his family to get the job done. When they all get together to brand and vaccinate, they also have rodeos and contests and potlucks. Ted, the son of a rodeo champion, also holds champion rodeo status. He said, "I hit the jack-pot on where I was born!"

Ted talked to us about his requirements for his bulls and told about how he purchased them. Although some of the traits he selected for are similar to those we need in North Carolina, there were some differences, notably strict selection for good feet and legs and not as high maternal value as we might want. Cows can't milk heavily and re-breed on limited forage. Good feed efficiency is a must too.

The North Carolina breeders soaked in the information and numbers that Ted gave them about what he and other commercial cattlemen are looking for. Visiting with the Teschers told me that we should always include commercial cattle ranches on our itineraries & from then on, we did.

In a similar vein, years ago, the late Dave Pingrey of Black Bull Cattle Company in Alabama, spoke to members at our N.C. Angus Association Regional Meetings. His philosophy was: "Develop your herd using in-herd comparison ratios among equally treated contemporary groups, make breeding decisions based on EPDs." He told us, "Don't be looking for the home run; just try to get on base." Very few of us will hit a home run in the Angus business. We dream of breeding that high dollar bull that will lead the breed and earn us fortune and fame; however, the likelihood of doing that is very slim. We should study the kinds of bulls serious local commercial breeders need and want, and do our best to breed that bull. For most of us, that is where 99.9% of our bull market is.

Visiting potential customers is paramount. Talking with them about their ideas and visibly assessing their herd is important. Sometimes timely and gently presented suggestions will make a big difference in your customer's ideas and most important, in his calf crop. Often commercial breeders are not as knowledgeable about data as you are. They don't need to be. They have you to help them.

With those lessons learned, the NCAA Board of Directors soon voted to actively encourage commercial breeders to be a part of our association. Dues were set to be about 2/3 those of registered breeders. Also near that time, directors voted to offer free year-long memberships to customers who bought cattle from members. After all, we need to know what bull buyers want, they said. We need to rub shoulders with our customers often, both for their sake and ours. After all, we aren't going to sell a whole lot of bulls to each other!

When the North Dakota ranchers get together for their round-ups, hearty meals for the cowboys and cowgirls are important. Recipes for a crowd featuring beef are rare and Kay Teischer shared a recipe with us that she often is asked to bring to pot-lucks. I have prepared this dish several times for large gatherings and it is always a hit. You may enjoy it too.

Taco Spanish Rice ala Kay Teischer, Medora, N.D.

2 lbs. browned beef 3 cups cooked rice 1 large can tomatoes 1 can kidney beans Small green pepper Small onion 1 can corn 1 pkg of Taco seasoning 1/2 cup of Velveeta (or more)

Salt, pepper to taste

Saute pepper and onion. Add all ingredients and simmer until hot. Cayenne pepper or jalapenos may be added for a spicier dish.
